Fourth Annual Yarchei Kallah Brings Alumni From Far and Wide

The Yeshiva's fourth annual Yarchei Kallah took place on the Sunday before Shavuos, May 28th, Gimmel Sivan, at Khal Kol Torah in Flatbush. It was a true Kiddush Hashem and a source of *chizuk* for the record breaking number of participants, many of whom were attracted by this year's new innovation – the featured alumni Roshei Chabura, who gave their

own presentations to smaller groups of alumni during the afternoon *seder*.

Many alumni made an extra effort to attend and apply themselves with greater hasmada when they heard about the Rosh HaYeshiva's tremendous mesiras nefesh to make the trip despite the fact that the Rebbetzin took ill and was hospitalized just

a few days earlier. The day's learning was dedicated as a *z'chus* for her complete recovery, *b'ezras Hashem*.

This year's participants included alumni who are pursuing their livelihood or education, as well as those who are learning full time in American Yeshivos. "I always loved being in the Rosh Yeshiva's *shiur*," re-

called Jonathan Briks, "so I really enjoyed the opportunity to once again participate in a seder and shiur with him. The whole environment made me feel like I was transported back to Toras Moshe – sitting and learning with guys who are really into it, and seeing my old friends, as well as the rebbeim: Rabbi Shmuli Weiner, Rabbi Naftali Meiselman, and Rabbi Moshe Chaim Jacobowitz. The *sugya* they chose – *s'chirus v'kabblanus b'Shabbos* – made it especially delightful; it's a huge sugya, and is so beneficial to shemiras Shabbos. Like many of my friends, I buy and sell things on eBay, and there were a lot of practical *halachos* that we gained from the afternoon seder and chaburos."

"The roshei chabura did their own, independent research on the sugya, giving it their own personal flavor, which made it very exciting," Zevy Krupka pointed out. "I joined Rav Avrohom Rudner's chabura; he lives in Toronto, and went through many halacha l'maaseh questions with Rav Shlomo Miller, sharing with us some of his very interesting chiddushim and rulings. For example, Rav Miller holds that in halacha a lawyer is not considered to be an employee who is

paid 'by the hour', even though he bills by the hour."

"The roshei chabura are people we had a real kesher with," said Moshe Mayer. "They're just a few years older than us; they're talmidim of our Yeshiva who have made great strides in their avodas Hashem. The hours we spent learning with them was a great source of chizuk. Rebbeim impart one essential type of chizuk; but there's something special you get from these individuals. Each one of them is still 'part of the chevra', but you're inspired when you see the fruits of their years of hasmada and effort.

"I feel that this was a day that truly encapsulated what the Yeshiva has been, what it is, and what it will continue to be b'ezras Hashem. The Rosh Yeshiva always mentions that a person must recognize his obligation to become a talmid chochom in the true sense of the word, and to constantly grow in his avodas Hashem. When we saw the younger chevra, and noticed how they, too, are fine bnei Torah in the derech of the Yeshiva, it was very encouraging."

Toras Moshe Alumnus Inspires Crowds:



abbi Gavriel – a.k.a. "Rav Gav" – Friedman is well known to countless people all over the world for his captivating Torah lectures that present the ideals of Yiddishkeit to a wide array of audiences in an intriguing yet entertaining fashion. Not many are aware, however, that Rabbi Friedman is a proud talmid of Yeshivas Toras Moshe.

Originally from Woodmere, NY, Rabbi Friedman learned in Ohr Yerushalayim; his rebbi, Rav Yehuda Shmulewitz suggested that he go to Toras Moshe, where he was a talmid for almost three years. "OJ had a profound impact on me," he acknowledges. "Toras Moshe, however, changed my life – it truly gave me a new perception of what *limud haTorah*, and everything else, really is! The *rebbeim* and the *chevra* were serious about Torah learning, but were also serious about enjoying life as a ben Torah! The zemiros on Shabbos, the sense of achdus that prevailed, all had a major impact on me!"

"I do a lot of traveling and teaching in many different communities throughout the world, and my goal is to bring people the *chizuk* they need. Interestingly, I probably have the greatest impact on those who actually come from a *frum* background but are still lacking a deep and meaninaful connection to Yiddishkeit."

"I work at Aish HaTorah. although, I'm only there for a couple of hours a day. I actually spend the rest of my day learning with my chavrusa. I try to learn a lot, so I guess you could say that learn-

ing and teaching best describes what I do. Together with my *chavrusa*, we learn the daf, and we also learn other areas of Torah – halacha, hashkafah, and machshava. It's this same Torah that I base my talks on: Gemaros, Rishonim, it's all in there. And, of course, you have what I call the "basics": Alei Shor, Michtay Me'Eliyahu, and Rabbeinu Yonah, both Shaarei Teshuva as well as his commentary on Pirkei Avos."

When you ask Rav Gav about how he feels about being a "celebrity" and being recognized everywhere he goes, he responds in his classic, engaging manner. "A talmid of mine was going through a particularly rough time in his life, and felt a need to 'get away' from it all. Having grown up in a secular home, he decided that Thailand would be a good place to escape to. So he's sitting out there on the beach in Thailand, totally in the middle of nowhere, chilling out and collecting his thoughts, and he thinks to himself, OK, what am I going to do now?

He decides to open his computer, and then makes up his mind that he's going to watch one of my *shiurim* that he recorded. As he's watching the *shiur*, somebody happens to walk by, a fellow with long hair, tattered clothing, no shoes – you can just imagine. He stops walking, glances at the screen, and says 'Hey - Ray Gay!' Taken by surprise, my student says to him, 'How do YOU know Rav Gav?' It turns out that this fellow once walked into Aish and sat in on my class, and it made an impression on him. Now, these two sat together on a beach in Thailand watching my shiur for a full hour....."

"This story gives new meaning to a mishna at the beginning of Pirkei Avos," continues Rav Gav. "V'ha'amidu talmidim harbei, establish many students, is immediately followed with words va'asu s'yaq la'Torah, make a protective fence for the Torah. When you can't go anywhere in the world where someone won't be your talmid, it's the greatest sort of protection and shemirah! You're stuck; you have to keep the Torah. Oy lanu mi'yom haDin!"

"I have tremendous hakoras hatov to the Rosh Yeshiva and the Mashgiach; Rav Moshe Twersky was a *malach*, an example of the great heights a person can attain. While in ToMo I became very close with Rabbi Shmuli Weiner. Ever since I left. we're on the phone several times a week (sometimes every night!). We discuss eitzos, halachic issues, hashkafah, as well as guidance in personal and family matters.

"One of the biggest 'take home' messages that I speak about is what the Rosh Yeshiva used to repeat to us so often: the "single minded focus" on Torah. You have to constantly make sure that you remain 'committed', that you're in the game. I use this a lot when speaking to my own talmidim. It's the key to life that I'm eager to share!"

"It was a tremendous honor and zechus." Rabbi Kaufman said, "to have been asked to come – especially from so far away – and give a *shiur* at the Yarchei Kallah. One of the questions he discussed was especially relevant to where we live: there's heavy snowfall very often, and there are specific Shabbos guidelines to follow when hiring snow removal crews. Alumni Join in a Chabura Spanning IVI SINGULAR OF THE COLUMN OF Zones

lumni in the United States, England and Eretz Yisroel have i joined together in a unique new learning *chabura* that truly transcends location. Rabbi Akiva Schwartz, a member of the Toras Moshe Kollel, delivers the *chabu*ra and sends out specially prepared marei mekomos; Yoni Pomper, an alumnus in New York, initiated and continues to take care of all the logistics.

"This *chabura*", Akiva explains, "was created to address a challenge faced by many of our alumni. They are no longer in the beis medrash full time and are not part of a regular iyun shiur, but they still want to learn b'iyun. Anyone who has experienced this sort of learning knows that it's not enough to just go through the Gemara and Rishonim that you see in front of you. You have to know about related Gemaras in other places in Shas, hidden issues between the lines and behind the scenes. Without a rebbi to present this to you in a *shiur*, you're on your own. You may have only two hours a day for a serious *seder*, making it difficult or impossible to get to the level of *iyun* you experienced and enjoyed when you were in Yeshiva. You feel somewhat lost, and you really need a guide to show you where the material you're seeking can be found. Ner Michoel provided the structure and framework for this project, which helped make it happen."

"Rabbi Sinowitz asked me to be the Ner Michoel representative for our year of alumni", Yoni Pomper recalls. "I began talking to some of the guys about what sort of things we could do to make our connection stronger and more meaningful. Reunions and get togethers might be nice, but as David Danesh pointed out, a connection through Torah, such as a regular chabura, is a much better way to go. Some people suggested a hashkafa va'ad from the rebbeim; most of the feedback, however, led us in the direction of Gemara b'iyun. With school or work taking up so much of everyone's time, we were really looking for something that would provide the sense of accomplishment and enjoyment we felt while we were in Yeshiva. Yes, there are many shiurim and sedorim for working people out there, but our group felt we could get something more like what we were

"We have a weekly conference call every Sunday, which is basically an hour long chabura", adds Akiva. "I find that they're well prepared because they already saw the *marei mekomos* and worked on them. Although I do most of the talking, the guys are constantly asking questions and offering comments, and I see that they really understand what's going on. You really need a 4 hour seder like we have in Yeshi-



va just to comprehend these Gemaras, so it's a real commitment on the part of the members, many of whom have learning sedorim in addition to their parnassa obligations. Personally, I find that it's an incredible experience: I have to translate what I've learned into a 'teachable' format, which is a very rewarding challenge. Whenever we finish a *sugya* in this *zman's limud* in Yeshiva, I find that I'm asking myself, if I had to give a chabura on this now, am I prepared? It changes the way I look at a sugya."

Yoni's perspective reflects the feelings shared by the chabura members: "Akiva presents the sugya with tremendous clarity, and the guys are very into it. Once again, we have a high quality of learning, just like we had back in Yeshiva, even though we're all so many miles away. It provides me with an anchor in my learning, keeping me in place despite my otherwise turbulent schedule, which was quite a challenge before.

"In the future," Yoni reflects, "perhaps we'll upgrade from a conference call to a video chat or something like that. We want to improve on this project and make it easier for others to join us."


